Chapter 2:26-30 "A Portrait of Humble Self-Sacrifice & Self-Denial" Wednesday, <u>September 25th</u>, 2024

Philippians 2:26-30:

[26] for he has been longing for you all and has been distressed because you heard that he was ill.

[27] Indeed he was ill, near to death. But God had mercy on him, and not only on him but on me also, lest I should have sorrow upon sorrow.

[28] *I* am the more eager to send him, therefore, that you may rejoice at seeing him again, and that I may be less anxious.

[29] So receive him in the Lord with all joy, and honor such men,

[30] for he nearly died for the work of Christ, risking his life to complete what was lacking in your service to me.

<u>4 Ways Epaphroditus Demonstrates Servant-Leadership:</u>

- He was <u>Selfless</u> More concerned for the needs of others than his own needs
- He was <u>Devoted</u> Willing to make whatever sacrifices were necessary and to push himself to the limit in his service to the Lord
- 3. He was <u>Willing To Submit to Another</u> Submitted himself to godly authority <u>as unto the Lord</u> and accepted the work asked of him
- He was <u>Worthy of Honor</u> A level of service that earned him honor among the brothers and sisters and held in high regard by them for these qualities

Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep.

Let the elders who rule well be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in preaching and teaching.
